In celebration of the 1987 Shiner Centennial, artist J. Jack Cloutier created a montage that tells the history of Shiner's first one hundred years beginning with its roots at Half Moon. The coming of the railroad was the magnet that prompted the establishing of the City at its present location. The railroad was the lifeline, and agriculture, represented by the cotton and corn, provided the livelihood in the developing economy of the city. Ranching and dairy farming supplemented the agriculture and finally, industry, represented bythe wire basket, was established. The United States and Texas flags are symbolic of the patriotic fervor of Shiner residents. The Gazebo represents the community spirit that has been responsible for Shiner's growth and development. The Logo is crowned with a skyline including churches, the Old Shiner Opera House, the City Hall, the Shiner Brewery, the Wire Works and the Water Tower, all of which are familiar landmarks and a part of Shiner's rich history.
